



MFL Curriculum Intent, Implementation and Impact Overview

The core language taught at Beverley St Nicholas Primary School is French. Our planning is based on the iLanguages Scheme of work for KS2, which covers all the components of the Programme of Study, and Little Languages for FS2 and KS1. It is the intention that all children in EYFS, KS1 and KS2 will access first quality teaching of French in order to adequately prepare them for KS3. We have developed a bespoke MFL curriculum, which meets the current needs of children at Beverley St Nicholas.

The aims of Primary Language teaching at Beverley St Nicholas Primary School are to:

- ✓ Foster an interest in language learning by introducing children to other languages in a way that is enjoyable and accessible to all pupils.
- ✓ Provide children with a MFL curriculum which is underpinned by; Global citizenship, Wellbeing and Aspirational values.
- ✓ Stimulate and encourage children's curiosity about language and creativity by experimenting with it.
- ✓ Support oracy and literacy through speaking and listening skills so that children; know more, remember more and understand more.
- ✓ Give an extra dimension to teaching and learning across the curriculum which fulfils the expectations from the National Curriculum.
- ✓ It is the intention that all children in EYFS, KS1 and KS2 will access first quality teaching of French in order to adequately prepare them for KS3.

We have identified the key intentions that drive our MFL Curriculum. At Beverley St Nicholas our MFL curriculum intentions are:

At Beverley St. Nicholas, the children are introduced to French in EYFS and taught French in formal lessons throughout Key Stage 1 (Years 1 and 2) and Key Stage 2 (Years 3-6).</p> <p>We deliver French in EYFS and KS1 using the scheme of work Little Languages. We use the iLanguages scheme of work to deliver French in KS2.</p> <p>In EYFS, class teachers deliver a weekly French session (approx. 10mins).
